(1) Bankruptcy filings declined 38 percent in 2006, most likely in response to the Bankruptcy Abuse Prevention and Consumer Protection Act (BAPCPA) of 2005 which took effect on October 17, 2005.

(2) Filings under Chapter 12 declined signficantly between 1990 and 2002, primarily because the statutory provisions for Chapter 12 expired and were re-enacted several times. In 2003, these filings more than doubled, most likely due to the retroactive extension of provisions for filing under Chapter 12. See 2003 Annual Report, pg. 25. In 2005, the BAPCPA made chapter 12 a permanent part of the Bankruptcy Code.
