Dear Mr. McCabe:

As a member of the Standing Committee on Rules of Practice and Procedure, you might be interested in the enclosed article. In this article, I propose an amendment to Rule 26(a) of the Federal Rules of Civil Procedure that would clarify and expand the scope of disclosure (and, therefore, discovery) regarding expert witnesses.

In the article, I argue that all items considered by a civil litigant's retained expert witnesses should be disclosed to the other parties in the suit, including previously privileged material and work product. In my view, full disclosure can enhance the truth-seeking process by making cross-examination of expert witnesses more effective.
